

Rare case of bilateral dermolipoma in 80 years old male

Description

Dermolipoma is a congenital lesion which occurs in and under the bulbar conjunctiva, usually towards the lateral canthus, between the superior and lateral rectus muscles. They are usually asymptomatic but may cause astigmatism due to pressure on the globe. We report a case of bilateral dermolipoma in a 80 year old male patient who visited us with complaint of missing upper and lower teeth since a year and wanted complete denture prosthesis. Patient was known hypertensive since 40years and was on medication for the same. On examination of his eyes, there was swelling in the lateral cantus of both right and left eye (Figure 1) measuring approximately 1X1cm in size extending 1cm medially from the limbus. The surface was yellowish and smooth. It was soft in consistency and non tender. The lesion was present since 20 years. Patient was referred for ophthalmologic consultation. As the lesion did not interfere with the vision patient was not willing for excision and was kept under observation.

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
